The National Arts Centre (NAC) is a Canadian centre for the performing arts. The NAC has clearly defined its national role in Canada's performing arts, through partnerships, through assisting artists and companies throughout the country, for bringing the best of what each region of the country has to offer to Canada's capitol in the now bi-annual Scene festival.
