The **Royal Canadian Military Institute** (**RCMI**) was founded as the Canadian Military Institute on January 14, 1890. General Sir William Dillon Otter set the founding principles: "to provide in an Institute for the defence forces of Canada a Library, museum and club for the purposes of the promotion of military art, science and literature, to gather and preserve the records of the defence forces and develop its specialized field in Canadian history. The RCMI is a Canadian icon, a vital national institution, with an illustrious history, mandate, and mission, unique in Canada.
